

Camp Fire Girls, Inc. Celebrates Birthday

Camp Fire Girls, Inc. is celebrating its 64th birthday this spring, having been started in 1910. This program was actually brought to Alaska in 1913 by Mrs. Elizabeth Kempthorne in Juneau.

Since its inception, Camp Fire has provided its members a bond between youth and adult, between black and white, and between different ethnic and religious groups, uniting its members in common causes and developing the feeling of equality between all people.

The Camp Fire program has always placed a great deal of emphasis on the study and association with Indian legendry and symbolism. This year the local Golden Heart Council of Camp Fire Girls is quite proud of our additional program for learning.

This is what is called the Alaskan Heritage Project. This is a completely comprehensive study of all the Eskimo and Indian cultures in our own state, with this year's introduction of the Southeastern Indians, including the Haidas, Tlingits and Tshimpshians.

The second year will deal with the Eskimos and Aleuts, and the third year with the Athabaskan culture.

Several of the local board members have worked very hard to put this interesting program together. They have had help from the University of Alaska, the State Museum, and the Museum of American Indians in New York City.

In addition to the study of legends and customs, the girls have had a guided tour of the museum at the University of Alaska with special stress on the Southeastern Indians.

Professor Sobeloff honored them with a slide presentation and lecture, and they had supervised instruction from a representative from the University of Alaska for the learning of a ceremonial dance.

The girls have made totems, masks, ceremonial rattles, ceremonial hats, meeting houses for the study of architecture in conjunction with their crafts as well as learning to recognize numerous totemic designs popular with the Southeastern Indians.

The entire project has been popular and well-received by the adults in leadership and the girls. We feel this study will add greatly to an understanding of our various groups within our own state and make for an easier co-existence as adults.

EDA Awards \$500,000 For Bethel Facilities

JUNEAU — Gov. William A. Egan said recently the Economic Development Administration has awarded a \$500,000 for improvement of docks and cargo shipping facilities at Bethel.

The state will provide a \$500,000 matching grant to complete the \$1 million project.

The federal funds were approved under the Public Works and Economic Development Act, which provides for needed public projects and creation of jobs in areas of high unemployment.

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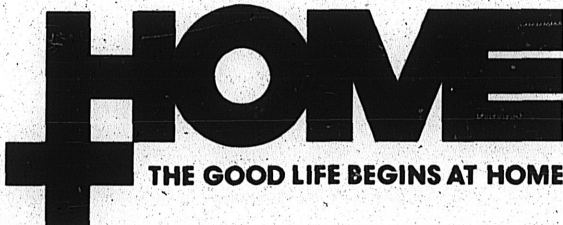
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
