Melvin Charles, Chairman:

First: We refer you to "State taxation of Indians: Impact of 1973 Supreme Court decision." Second: Bureau of Indian Affairs: Should Indians be prefer-

entially employed? Reviewing these two deci-Reviewing these two deci-sions and reviewing the point system advanced in the proposed limited entry law, we find that although the State of Alaska has jurisdiction in Public Law 280, 10 articles of the constitution remain intact for the use of Organized Native villages (Or-ganized Village of Kake VS. Egan) and that said 10 articles pertain to Civil rights. That the state cannot interfere in the internal affairs of any reserva-tion or an organized group of tion or an organized group of Indians.

Rather than to press the le-gality of the impact of Limited

Entry as it pertains to Organ-ized Native villages, or the for-mation of an instrumentality of the government, under the Act of 1934, I.R.A. Act, we wish to recommend that the point sys-tem be revised to allow every fishermen of Native extraction, or Natives who are members of, or participate in the I.R.A. Act, sufficient points to carry out the mandate in the State Con-stitution, the "Disclaimer clause" which in essence is proclause" which in essence is pro-tection of Native fishing rights. We respectfully present this our recommendation to the Limited Entry Commission.
