Mr. Troutman saw the critical need for better lighting and predicted the coming of it. He was not alone however. There were others who helped our village in our pursuit of civilization. There were other great men

like Nathan L. Smith of Kirkland, Washington, 1932, Frank J. Daugherty, 1938, just to name a few who, also as schoolteachers, helped much to improve living conditions in our village.

Today, many homes are lighted with electricity from Bering Sea Light & Power owned and operated by Irrigoo and Sons of Gambell, Alaska.

This is just the beginning. There is a great need for a more bigger and reliable source of electricity to meet the demands of ever-increasing village of approximately 400 people.
