BARROW, (Special)—Yesterday Sunday while I was watching a TV movie, one of my sons came alongside of me asking me if I knew a man who died, by the name of Dr. Henry Forbes. "Why, yes," I said to him. "What's the matter, Son?"

He said he reads in the papers and found out that Dr. Forbes passed away. After he had said these words he handed me the Tundra Times papers. "Son," I told him, "we all will pass away some day, but we do not know when."

In 1962 when I went down to the States after we had talked to the officials in Washington, D. C., Miss Madigan, executive secretary of American Association of Indian Affairs, ask me if I want to visit Forbes who stationed in Massachusetts.

I didn't wait to answer, I'm willing to go there. Next day we flew east to Mass., landed and Dr. Forbes and others including me, gets in the car and drove to his home.

Every morning before breakfast, Dr. Forbes would exercise lifting himself up and down, as if he was 25 years old. Dr. Forbes was 79 then when I went down.

Dr. Forbes has done a wonderful deeds to the Eskimos, Indians and Aleuts. I am not the only one who got shocked of his death. I know Inupiat in Alaska would, after all when he has done so much for Alaskans.
