

4-H Girls Do Homemaker Services To Earn Money for Knitting Supplies

An enterprising group of 4-H Club girls in Stebbins, near the mouth of Yukon River, have devised a unique way to earn their own money to purchase knitting needles.

The group has set up a Home-making Service by posting jobs each is willing to perform, along with prices for the services.

Examples are: Washing dishes, 10 cents; sweeping a floor, 5 cents; baby sitting, 10 cent per hour; making a bed, 10 cents; and mixing dough, 15 cents.

Each girl has a goal of 50 cents to earn, which is the price of needles needed for a knitting project they have in mind. Mittens for themselves and younger members of their families will result in colorful handwear as they learn knitting skills under the guidance of Nancy Wobser, club leader.

"Self reliance and initiative, both characteristics of the enterprise are as important in the learning process as the knitting itself," said Gladys Musgrove, District Home Agent with the University of Alaska Cooperative Extension Service.
