Senator Willie Hensley (D-Kotzebue) introduced a bill to increase the minimum organization grants for municipal governments outside an organized borough from \$25,000 to \$75,000.

Asked to comment on the measure, Senator Hensley stated, "I do not consider the present \$25,000 figure a very realistic one considering the costs involved in setting up a local organized government, particularly when one considers the experience of the recently org-

anized North Slope Borough.

"The present figure of \$25,000 is totally inadequate to provide the necessary front money to set up a borough.

"This measure will have a direct effect on the attempts of the unorganized borough to establish borough governments."

The bill, SB 79, has been referred to the committee on Local Government.

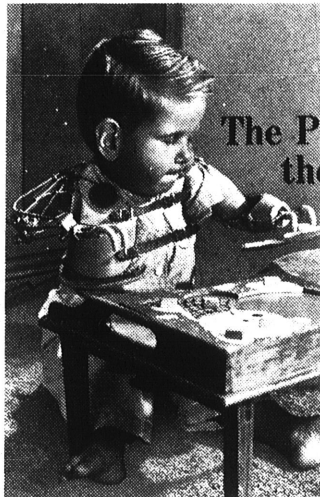

Egan Appoints Father James Poole

The Alaska State Council on the Arts announced that Governor William A. Egan has appointed Father James Poole, S.J., of Nome as Vice Chairman of the State Arts Council.

In accepting the Governor's appointment, Father Poole, a second term Council Member said, "I am honored to serve as Vice Chairman of the Alaska State Arts Council. I feel sure that I will continue to enjoy my association with this wonderful group of dedicated people."

Father Poole has been a long and ardent supporter of the arts and crafts of Alaska. His knowledge and understanding of the state's cultural heritage has made him a well respected figure.

In making the award, Governor Egan commented, "I am aware of the fine work you are doing presently as a member of the Council, and am confident that you are entirely capable of assuming the duties of Chairman when the Chairman is not able to be present."

Father Poole was born in Cle Elum, Washington. After graduation from high school, he attended the Novitiate of St. Francis Xavier in Sheridan, Oregon. Upon completion of four years study, he attended the University of Gonzaga in Spokane majoring in philosophy.

One of his first missionary posts was Holy Cross, Alaska where he taught at the Mission. Father Poole then attended a seminary in Alma, California. In his third year at Alma he was ordained a priest.

His final years of spiritual training were at Mt. Village, Alaska, on the lower Yukon where he lived for three years. Father Poole became superior at St. Mary's Mission on the Yukon and served there for five years.

He then spent a year at Pt. Barrow before taking up residence at Nome.

Since his arrival in Nome, Father Poole realized one of his main ambitions, that of building an educational radio

station that would broadcast to 52 villages.

His dream was fulfilled in July of 1971 when KNOM signed on the air. KNOM reaches 85 villages and has a listening area of 146,000 square miles.

With 10,000 watts daytime and 5,000 watts at night, it covers 8 major fields of education including: economy, health, character, education, child care, sanitation, social problems, and youth. Morning prayer, daily spiritual guidance session, a program of religious instruction for the young people, and Sunday mass add the spiritual focus.

Listeners report in from as far as the Aleutian Islands.

Short Course on Properties of Ice

FAIRBANKS - The University of Alaska will offer a six-week short course on "Properties of Ice" during January and February if demand warrants it.

The course is designed to aid engineers and others in their studies of ice-related problems. It will cover structure of ice and sea ice, ice growth in natural systems (such as streams and oceans), thermal properties of ice, and electrical properties of ice.

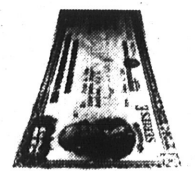
Teaching the course will be Dr. Thomas Osterkamp, assistant professor of physics at the university.

Enrollment will be held through Jan. 30 at the Division of Statewide Services, 105 Fielson Building on the university campus. The class will meet Wednesday evening, Jan. 24 to determine a schedule of meetings for the six sessions. The course will be cancelled if fewer than 20 students sign up.

Tuition is \$18 and partici-
