Ruby and Koyukuk with use of surplus power from local State Operated Schools.

Mauneluk, Inc., based at Kotzebue, lists health, fisheries co-op expansion and education as its three areas of greatest concern. President of the five-member board is Vincent Schuerch, Kiana. Mauneluk, reorganized from the old Northwest Alaska Native Association, wants thorough regional comprehensive health planning within three years.

Mauneluk also would like to seek a consumer warehouse to supply all NANA villages with gas and oil products and other goods, and a good land claims course at the secondary school level.

Community organization is the number one priority of the Southeastern Alaska Community Action Program, based at Juneau, with Edward Churchill, Wrangell, chairman of the board. Community planning, housing, health care sanitation and economic development are other priorities of SEACAP.

SEACAP will devote much time over the next three years to getting all available persons functions effectively in admini-

stration of the land claims, resources and completion of land selection, while encouraging efficient, orderly growth of service communities. SEACAP will also work with the Bureau of Indian Affairs and Alaska State Housing Authority on housing programs and with various agencies to relieve health problems.

The Upper Yukon Development Corp., based at Fort Yukon, chairman of the board, cites housing as its biggest problem.

Three-year goals for this region were simply states: 143 houses in the region, 11 villages to have adequate fuel systems, 11 villages to have electricity and more employment for residents of the Upper Yukon.

Yupiklak Bista Inc., at Bethel, is most concerned about land selection for 25 villages under the land claims act. Also of top importance are village incorporation, treatment of alcoholism and improvement of transportation (for mail, freight and travel) health and education services.

Eddie Hoffman, Bethel, chairs the 15-member board, whose three-year goal is to provide improvements in each area.

## Doyon's Business Training Seminar Begins Oct. 15

FAIRBANKS — Doyon Limited, with funds coming from the Division of Manpower Training and the Bureau of Indian Affairs, will sponsor an eight-week business training seminar beginning Oct. 15.

Eight students chosen from the course, to be conducted at the Adult Education Career Center, will learn the basic aspects of corporate structure, municipal governments, long and short range planning, budgeting, accounting procedures, investments and land selection technology.

Doyon is accepting applications from interested people who live in the rural areas within the Tanana Chiefs Conference. All applicants will be carefully screened to select the eight individuals.

The selections will primarily be dependent on whether each individual will take this training and bring it back to his home village and utilize the knowledge with the different land claims corporations.

The students will be housed at the University of Alaska and provided with a subsistence allowance of \$278 per month during the course.
