Alaska Review to feature Alcohol and 200 mile limit

Alcohol in Alaska and the 200-mile limit will be featured in ALASKA REVIEW's May show.

Booze, bootlegging and the Governor's bill on alcoholism are part of a segment on alcohol in Alaska. ALASKA REVIEW examines the Governor's packet of bills and asks whether or not they can be effective in reducing the amount of liquor Alaskans consume and interviews a bootlegger whodescribes how bootlegging works and the incredible profit it brings in.

The 200-mile limit has been in effect for more than two months and some Alaskan fisherman are claiming that the Japanese are reaping the major benfits from this new law. ALASKA REVIEW travels with the U.S. Coast Guard on fisheries patrol to monitor the activities of the foreign fishing fleet and to observe boardings of these boats.

The hour-long show for May also will include brief sections on the recent tanker trials in Valdez Arm and a visit to Petersburg to take part in that Southeast Alaska community's Little Norway Festival.
