Alaskans' right to clean air and water under attack

In the name of fiscal responsibility, some legislators are considering budget cuts and shifts which would reduce or remove the ability of your Department of Environmental Conservation to enforce clean air and clean water laws and regulations in Alaska.

consumptive uses if we first insist that our legislators and governor protect the air, water, vegetation and land that our fish and wildlife breed and live in.

Please write, telephone or send public opinion messages from your legislative information officers to let your legislators know that you want them to cut waste and non-essential government projects and programs and to increase air, water and habitat protection and improvement programs.
