The funds will be used to provide loans to the villages for the purchase of fuel oil and will provide grants for the difference in air and barge transportation costs to have the fuel flown into the villages.

"there is a great need about to assure that some of this money is used to help Alaskans meet high energy costs on a continuing basis," Hammond said his proposed Permanent Fund Dividend bill, introduced earlier this week as a major part of his Energy Package, is designed to do that by providing income tax credits or cash payments to Alaskans to help meet energy costs.

The Energy package will also provide both grants to determine the feasibility of establishing bulk storage facilites and grant and loan funds to purchase storage tanks.

The bill signed into law also appropriates \$250,000 to the Office of the Governor, contingency fund, to be used as a last resort for energy emergency relief.
