Every time a shareholder of Calista joins any other group to fight the business in which he shares ownership, he is fighting for the failure of that business. If this is the case, can we feel that Charlie Kairaiuak is concerned for the rest of the Calista shareholders? No. He is only on an ego trip funded by people who have subversive motives toward Calista.

As for the Shell Oil contract: there has never been a better contract made with an oil company on the United States soil. We just didn't run out and make

a "deal" as Charlie Kairaiuak tries to imply. We negotiated for 19 months with many oil companies; one time in Denver, Colo. with 28 of them.

In December, 1973, I asked the Board of Calista to fund a program for \$3 million. Eddie Hoffman felt that it was wrong to spend the peoples' money for a seismic program, when we had a good offer from Shell. All I ask, is why, if anyone (including Charlie Kairaiuak's letter writers) feel that there was a "deal" made, charges aren't filed against feel that there was a "deal" made, charges aren't filed against made, charges aren't rifed against us.
