Students Need Holiday Money

The Nome Nugget reports that 50 young people at the William E. Beltz High School are looking for part time jobs so they can earn money to go to their village homes for Christmas holidays. The Beltz school has predom-

inantly native students from almost all villages in the north. Mrs. Linda Ellanna, dormitory

director, wrote to the Nugget last week and said that the school had written to parents and village councils and found that 50 students had parents who were destitute and could not afford to pay for their children's plane fare home for the holidays.

"These students," Mrs. Ellanna wrote, "are willing to do any type of job offered to them to make at least some portion of

this money.

"If you could somehow give us some newspaper publicity concerning this problem in the immediate future, it would greatly be appreciated by each and every student at Beltz, and their parents in the villages.

"I personally would appreciate anything you could do for us."

Mrs. Ellanna said that if twothirds of the students have their total round-trip fares paid up by Nov. 15, there would be a twoweek vacation.
