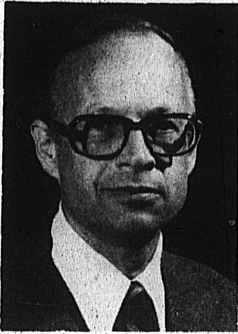

Jimmy B. Bedford, both of Fair-
banks, Alaska has submitted appli-
cation to purchase on his Headquar-
ters Site Settlement Claim, Serial

INVITATION FOR BIDS

Sealed bids will be received from
Contractors by the University of
Alaska in Room 101, Bunnell Build-
ing for the construction of Wrangell
Subdivision Roads until two o'clock
in the afternoon (2:00) Alaska Day-
light Saving Time, on August 14,
1974, and then at said office will be
publicly opened and read aloud.

The project consists of clearing,
grading and shaping of roadway, in-
stallation of culverts and gravel sur-
facing of approximately 4.6 miles of
subdivision roads within Section 33,
T1S, R2E, F.M.

All work must be completed with-
in forty-five (45) calendar days fol-
lowing award of the contract except
as otherwise provided.

Contract Documents may be ex-
amined at the offices of the Associated
General Contractors in Fairbanks;
at the Construction Plan Bureau in
Fairbanks; and at the office of Stutz-
mann Engineering Co. in Fairbanks.

Contract Documents may be ob-
tained at the offices of Stutzmann
Engineering Co., 9 Adak Street, Fair-
banks, Alaska by bona fide Bidders
upon deposit of Thirty Dollars
(\$30.00). Deposits will be returned
within ten (10) days after the Bid
Opening upon return of the docu-
ments in satisfactory condition. Re-
quests for mailing of Contract Docu-
ments must be accompanied by a sepa-
rate non-refundable payment of Ten
Dollars (\$10.00) to cover costs of
wrapping, handling and airmail post-
age.

Bid security must be furnished
by each Bidder as set forth in the
instructions to Bidders. Performance
Bond and Payment Bond will be re-
quired of the successful Bidder.
The University of Alaska reserves
the right to reject any or all bids,
to waive any informality in Bids received
and to accept or reject any items of
any Bid.

Bids may be held by the Univer-
sity of Alaska for a period not to ex-
ceed fifteen (15) days from the date
of opening of Bids for the purpose of
reviewing the Bids and investigating
the qualifications of Bidders prior to
award.

BIA Commissioner Announces Appointments

Indian Affairs Commissioner
Morris Thompson announced the
appointment of three Native Am-
ericans to fill three BIA agency
superintendent positions in Al-
aska on July 18, 1974.

Those named are Peter Three
Stars, age 47, an Oglala-Sioux
Indian, appointed Superinten-
dent of the Bethel Agency ef-
fective August 4. Frederick P.
Baker, age 35, an enrolled mem-
ber of the Mandan-Hidatsa
Tribes, will administer the Fair-
banks Agency, effective August

1; and Gary T. Longley, Sr., age
42, an enrolled Eskimo, becomes
Nome Agency superintendent on
Sept. 1, 1974.

The superintendent of these
agencies will be the top line of-
ficers responsible for the admin-
istration of all bureau programs
within their geographic bounda-
ries. They will also be responsible
to the Area Director to insure
that area and bureau policies are
carried out consistent with the
intent of Congress.

"Bethel, Fairbanks and Nome

Agency Superintendent have
been vacant for over a year,"
Area Director Clarence Antioquia
pointed out. "Before we made
any decisions as to appointments,
we consulted with Native leaders
before asking them to identify
qualified candidates for the jobs.
We then reviewed the submissions
and made selections, conferring
with the Native community again
before naming the superinten-
dents.

"The men chosen have proven
ability as high-calibre adminis-

trators. Along with their profes-
sional experience and education-
al credentials they have lived and
worked in Alaska for the bureau,
and they know the problems and
concerns of Alaska Natives," he
explained.

When the announcement was
made Antioquia said, "This cul-
minates a search for the best tal-
ent available to fill these impor-
tant positions. I am highly
pleased that Commissioner
Thompson accepted my recom-
mendations for these appoint-
ments."

You've read the notice printed at the right
many times and by now you realize your
Co-op is normally very busy during Fair-
banks' short construction season.

HOWEVER . . .

This year we're receiving twice as many
new service applications as we did last
year. If you're planning to build this season
and you still haven't applied for power and
satisfied all GVEA requirements, you should
plan to locate your new home so the electric
service entrance is no more than 150 feet
from a suitable existing pole if overhead
service is planned, and 250 feet from a suit-
able existing pole or padmount transformer
location if underground service is planned.

OTHERWISE . . .

Because of the limited time available and
an acute shortage of construction materials
Caused by long delivery delays, we may be
unable to energize your new home before
winter sets in or the 1975 construction
season arrives.

To help us meet your electrical require-
ments and minimize delays, we recom-
mend that you:

- construct your new residence or business adjacent to Golden Valley's
many miles of existing power lines if possible.
- check with GVEA customer service department concerning availability
of electric service if you plan to purchase property that is not adjacent
to suitable distribution facilities.
- purchase your property, arrange for financing, THEN apply for power
and complete necessary paperwork and pay required fees EARLY.

OVERHEAD LINES

Because of the high seasonal volume of hook-ups versus limited manpower
and equipment, line extension delays of two months or longer can be expected
if the customer fails to complete ALL his requirements by July 1st for over-
head line extensions (see special underground requirements below).

UNDERGROUND LINES

Due to the limited (June through September) construction season for high-
voltage underground facilities, and production delays for required material,
GVEA cannot install high-voltage underground in approved subdivisions unless
the following requirements are met by the subdivider:

- apply for power, secure Borough/GVEA approval of plat for underground
power installation, complete ALL paperwork and pay required fees and
charges by May 15th.
- R.O.W. clearing and conduit for road crossings must be ready for GVEA
final inspection by June 1st.
- no excavation or construction (except GVEA) should be in progress
near powerline R.O.W. or conduit road crossing after June 1st.
