

All-AIC to Buy Certain Assets

FAIRBANKS, Ak. — Two of Alaska's largest corporations, Alaska International Industries, Inc., and Alaska Interstate Company, announced today that Alaska Interstate has agreed to sell certain assets of its Burgess Construction Company to Alaska International Construction, a subsidiary of Alaska International Industries.

Neil Bergt, president of Alaska International Industries, and O. Charles Honig, president of Alaska Interstate, expressed their mutual pleasure over the transaction which will involve the conveyance by Burgess of its heavy construction equipment and certain heavy construction jobs to Alaska International Construction.

Completion of the approximately \$5 million transaction is subject to certain approvals, including the approval of the boards of the respective companies.

Lon McDermott, president of Alaska International Construction, said that Alaska

International Construction, which is headquartered in Fairbanks, will specialize in heavy construction throughout Alaska.

Preston Locher, chief executive of Burgess, and George Easley, chief operating officer of Burgess, said that Burgess Construction will concentrate on the construction of educational, industrial and commercial buildings, the type of work the company began doing when it was founded 22 years ago.

Mr. Honig stated that Mr. Locher, who recently joined Burgess as its chief executive officer, and Mr. Easley had done a fine job in reshaping and reorienting Burgess in Alaska. Both Mr. Honig and Mr. Locher expressed their confidence in the future of Burgess.
