

Scheduled for Mar. 14-15—  
**Anthropology Meeting**

**FAIRBANKS** — The Second Annual Alaska Anthropology Conference is scheduled for March 14-15 on the University of Alaska, Fairbanks campus.

The featured speaker will be the chairman of the Department of Anthropology at the University of California at Los Angeles, Wendell H. Oswalt. He will keynote the conference on Friday, March 14, at 1 p.m.

Oswalt is no stranger to Alaskan anthropology, having worked in the Lower Kuskokwim region. He has also served as a visiting professor on the UA campus in the past.

His talk, which will be delivered in the Fine Arts Auditorium, will be entitled "The Complexity of Eskimo Technology."

The conference is being sponsored by the University of Alaska Department of Anthropology. Emphasis will be on the northern aspects of anthropology, especially Alaska. However, a spokesman said, "The scope of the presentations and papers has been broadened to include topics of general anthropological interest."

One highlight of the conference will be a special preview showing of a film produced by Leonard

Kamerling and Sarah Elder of the Alaska Historical Heritage Film Project entitled "At the Time of Whaling." The project is a part of the Center for Northern Educational Research.

The film will be shown in the Fine Arts Concert Hall on campus.

Other than the two events so far mentioned, the conference will be held in the university's Wood Center.

Other subjects which will be discussed at the conference include a presentation by Claude Demientieff entitled "Cultural Changes of Alaska Natives." That talk will center around health care.

Dr. Mim Dixon of the Fairbanks North Star Borough's Pipeline Impact Office will discuss "The Potentials of Anthropological Research and Study in Alaska."

There will also be a round table discussion on how native Alaskan can exploit anthropology and anthropologists, discussions of linguistics, and other anthropological and sociological discussions.

Registration for the two-day conference is \$5, with a special rate of \$2 for students.

The bill is a response to two CBA decisions relating to the Alaska Service Investigation which created monopoly situations in air service to southeastern and northwestern Alaska, including Nome, Kotzebue and Unalakleet.

"These decisions were not in the public's interest. In its attempt to strengthen the financial prospects of Alaskan air operations, the Civil Aeronautics Board did not give enough weight to the commerce, postal and national defense needs, or to the public's transportation needs," he said.

The senator pointed out that the CAB's decision was particularly untimely for the northwest area which was hit with severe flooding last fall.

"These Alaskans are now rebuilding. Food, supplies, and construction materials are needed. The only means of

transporting these materials and foodstuffs during the winter months is by air. This entire emergency situation has been put on the capabilities of only one airline," he said.

Stevens said the North Slope oil development and the Native Claims Settlement Act also have stimulated the economy and increased the demand on air service in these areas.

Also under the bill, additional air carriers to such areas would not have maximum subsidy limits and would be assured subsidies when needed to continue operations there.

The senator's bill would require the CAB to take into consideration whether alternate modes of transportation are available when authorizing air service to communities. The CAB would have to provide for at least two air carriers in areas not serviced by railroads or highways.

once, but they kept taking turns and we must have had at least eight rest stops on the three-mile trail. Two other dog teams passed us on the way."

The Drake team was better trained, Bedford said. "When we started, we didn't stop for anything — until the sled tipped over."

Bedford explained that his six-foot, three inch height and 250-pound weight must have made the sled top heavy.

"We were just going great and those dogs were running like 'a house afire' when we had to make a curve and the sled turned over about a mile down the trail," he said.

"If I had let go, the dogs would have been over the finish line in record time. But I held on and the dogs quickly got the message: Pulling the sled on its side — and dragging me through the snow — was just a bit of a drag and they stopped just long enough for me to hop back on the runners and say 'Mush!'"

"Off we went again," Bedford said, "and I don't think we lost more than 20 seconds in the fall."

In spite of the fine dogs, Tundra Times came in three minutes after the winner, Tom Scheimo of KJNP, who made the trip in a little more than 14 minutes. Second place was Mike Wellings of KFAR, with third place going to Roberta Redloff of the Fairbanks Daily News-Miner.

"Although we didn't win first

place, we ran a gallant race — and we finished, Bedford said.

This was not true of two teams. One musher, Jackie Singleton, of KMPS, let go of her sled and the dogs brought it in without her. Geoff Kennedy of KUAC, a gentleman of the old school, stopped his sled and gave the lady in distress a ride to the finish line.

Pete Van Nort of KIAK forgot to tell his dogs to "GEE" at the turnaround and they took a left turn to the Alaska Department of Fish and Game on College Road. They must have smelled the fish and thought it was time for mush.
