—Several Eskimo dances were held and there is an encouraging sign that this dance is here to stay, and will not be a forgotten tradition.

Young Eskimo children performed beautifully and with pride. Barbara and Gary Noteboom and Darby and Del Stanton are to be commended for their very well done performances.

There are also other Caucasians in practice, so maybe we'll have Eskimo A-Go-Go in the near future. Paul Green, a famed Eskimo dancer and story teller is the instructor.

—The Kotzebue Community Chorus, which made radio news, presented its Second Annual Christmas Concert both here in

town and at the Site (Air Force).

The directors were Lt. James Moon of the Site and Dr. David Wyatt of our local Public Health Service Hospital. The soloists were: Barbara Noteboom, Soprano; Anne Wyatt, alto; and Larry Brewer, tenor. The accompanist was Peggy Merritt.

In all, the chorus has thirty (30) members of both Caucasian and Native nationalities. The chorus plans another concert in the spring.

—Kotzebue Senior Center is coming into existence. The older citizens of Kotzebue will be receiving cards calling for a meeting January 21, 1969, at the Cudd Hall. The funds for this program are from the state.

This program is not a form of a church program so all senior citizens are urged to attend. An open house is planned soon after supplies get in, which hopefully will be shortly after the meeting.

—A newly formed Kotzebue Housing Committee has been working feverishly on a \$80,000 BIA funded housing grant planned for Kotzebue.



## Fairbanks Safety Council Supports Year-round Snow Vehicle Trails

Establishment of specific, regulated trails within the city to be used year-round for snow vehicles, bicycles and for jogging, as proposed by city planner Dean Hopkins, received unanimous support of the Fairbanks Health and Safety Council at its monthly meeting this week.

Also by unanimous action, the Council voted to request both the city and the North Star Borough to prohibit the use of snow vehicles in specified restricted school and hospital zones.

Letters advising them of the Council's action on these matters will go to city manager Wally Droz and borough chairman John Carlson.

The need for amendment of the state's current snow vehicle statute, Chapter 182, 1968, was discussed by Council members and area legislators present at the meeting.

Senator Edward Merdes and representatives Tury Anderson and Eugene Miller participated in the discussion and there was general consensus that the present statute should be amended to provide a minimum age limit for operators of snow vehicles.

The general consensus being that age 12 would be a fair and

equitable minimum, working a minimum hardship on rural area families in which children often are called upon to operate snow vehicles on family trap lines.
