Cost of Living Up in Alaska

The Bureau of Labor Statistics released figures last week showing that living costs Anchorage, Fairbanks, Juneau and Ketchikan ranged from 18 to 32 per cent above the cost of a comparable living pattern in Seattle in the fall of 1966-a range narrower by 2 index points than that reported in 1965.

The cost of all items combined rose more in Juneau and Ketchikan than in Seattle, causing the differential in living costs to advance by l percentage point in each city.

In Juneau the rise was due chiefly to faster rising prices for housing, medical care and food away from home.

In Ketchikan the advance was due mainly to faster increasing prices for foods purchased for home consumption and higher costs for fuel and utilities.
