We need to reach out to people who are willing to listen, and to create new allies amongst the four sacred colors. In this way, we make our contribution to the vision of healing during this time."

The members of the NAFWS believe that all parts of the natural world, including humans, are closely related in an intricate web of harmony and interdependence.
