Finally, the general impact on land value and use as great areas are brought into reach and productive commitment (including recwould have its reational) effects on the fiscal soundness of Alaska as the tax and base broadened. revenue

In summary, the time is right in terms of expected returns for a major extension of the Alaska Railroad to open up the great area north and west of Fairbanks.

To not embark on such an undertaking would likely be to seriously limit the pace and extent of development of the State to a degree incompativle with the national interest.

That such action merits consideration is unquestionable. A necessary first step is accomplishment of the engineering, market, and other surveys required to measure the problems, potentialities and desirable timing for the proposal.

Thus, planning for the of the Alaska extension Railroad should accompany the previously proposed expedited mineral exploration and research program.

The engineering surveys contemplated would include photo reconnaissances to further define route selection. soil analyses, preliminary designs, and other actions estimated to cost \$4.70 million for the Dunbar to sector and \$2.25 Kobuk for the Alatna to million Gubic sector.

been a 1,700 year old stone ve seel with a boat shape on one side and a face with two lip plugs (labrettes) on the other. Definitely Bering Sea resembled a loaf of bread with Eskimo, Dumond said.

He also has found a connection with Pacific Coastal Eskimos about 500 A.D. He has an idea of when Aleuts and Eskimos were one group of people, but he isn't saying vet. He wants to think about it a bit longer.

Katmai is a good place to study relationships because it's right between different groups of people, he explained.

Scientists know that Aleuts and Eskimos are related because their languages are from the same family. But no one has yet pinned down when the groups separated.

Until Dr. Dumond. Katmai area never had been studied by archaeologists.

This summer he is helping the National Park Service locate sites of semisubterranean aboriginal houses dated from 1,800 to 1,200 B.C. They have charcoal stained floors with fire places in the middle and artifacts scattered about.

Roofs of caribou hide and poles will be reconstructed for the benefit of visitors to the area.

Besides technical information about kinds of pottery and weapons, Dumond has learned a few facts about people who camped on the Brooks River.

They fished, hunted caribou and liked beaver tails. In a few years, Dr. Dumond may return to learn more.


