back-up stations.

EMERGENCY STATIONS

Emergency listening stations are also being installed. The first of these is now operable at the PHS hospital in Tanana. It has two 1,000 watt SSB units with remote controls at the nurses' stations.

The Tanana station is attended 24 hours a day making it possible for emergency calls to be heard and attended to speedily.

Similar stations are planned for PHS hospitals in Barrow, Kotzebue, Bethel, Kanakanak, and in Anchorage.

Stichler and his assistant George Kidder plan to complete SSB installations in the Fairbanks District in the near future with additional work at Barrow, Wainwright, Kaktovik on Barter Island, and Kaltag down the Yukon River.

Installation of new radios is being planned in the many villages of the Bethel area in lower Kuskokwim in 1969.
