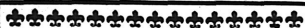

### PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT

The Ukpeagvik Inupiat Corporation is currently cosponsoring the production of a film documentary portraying the lives and work of "Inupiat Artists of Alaska." The Inupiat Community of the Arctic Slope, a prime sponsor for the production, received a grant from the National Endowment of the Arts to begin shooting.

Production began in late February 1981, during the first major Eskimo arts and crafts show ever held in Barrow. UIC sponsored this event, entitled "Suhavut What we have made."

To date, numerous Inupiat artists have been filmed at work and interviewed in an attempt to gain in-depth insights into their work. The artists interviewed thus far are internationally renowned, and their various paintings, carvings, sculptures, drawings, traditional hand-crafted tools and everyday utensils are on display in prominent museums, universities, and numerous buildings. They also can be found in the collections of private art connoisseurs.

We believe that our production will provide a refreshing outlook on today's Inupiat artists, their culture, and how they view the world around them. This production is not of the commercial-advertisement genre. It will be unique. The film will portray the total environmental apprenticeship that each artist experiences in his upbringing in the diverse regions of Alaska where Eskimos are located.

We have raised \$20,000 so far for the production of "INUPIAT ARTISTS." We need an additional \$30,000 to complete this project. The Ukpeagvik Inupiat Corporation would like to secure your assistance through any contribution you are able to make. Share with us in the credit for a truly beautiful, culturally enriching, and permanent contribution to the arts.

Our production artists are Bo and Betty Boudart of Anchorage, Alaska.
