restrictive terms opening the haul road could cost the State several million more each year unless users are made to bear these costs.

Many "fiscal conservatives" who berate increasing costs of government are among those who argue heatedly that the haul road should be thrown open wide and maintained fully by the State.

Yet, few demand the tax increases or user charged necessary to offset the attendant annual multimillion dollar increase in cost of government should this action be taken. It seems appropriate that the cost of haul road maintenance, for example, be met by either a gas tax increase or user charges. Accordingly, perhaps the best way to determine whether the majority truly favors opening the road and the resultant governmental growth, would be to make such opening contingent upon a demonstration of willingness to pay such increased costs through first passing the necessary legislation.

The administration has evidenced a willingness to submit revenue-engendering measures which would accrue on-going funds to provide for such things as a highway, ferry and airport maintenance. These, to date, however, have not received favorable action by the legislature nor overwhelming public support. In the absence of the

same, our presumption has to be that those who demand a reduction in State expenditures and oppose measures which could engender recurring new revenues must not believe that increased State services warrant the additional financial burden.

On-going State government services should be funded by on-going revenue-raising measures such as taxes; not from exhausting non-renewable revenues. I would hope, at least, that we have learned something in that regard from those 900 million object lessons.

Those who protest that the ship of state is swamping in a rising flood of deficit expenditures and yet fail to demand that such means of funding be provided for to meet new costs attending the new services they want simply open up the seacocks to yet another tidal bore of red ink into which they and all of us hypocritical, malfunctioning, self-priming, budge-pumping politicians who ignore such truths should be made to walk the plank.

The haul road will be opened to the extent Alaskans are willing to pay for it—environmentally, socially and economically. In that process I believe most Alaskans desire first to read the price tags, not simply write blank checks.

DCS/RDA MERGE

Eric Lee, Director of the newly consolidated Division of Community and Rural Development, said today one of the first acts of his new position will be to clarify misunderstandings surrounding the merger of two divisions within the Department of Community and Regional Affairs.

The Governor's Management and Efficiency Review recommended the merger of the Divisions of Community Services (DCS) and Rural Development Assistance (RDA).

"The merger of the two divisions had been under consideration by the Department for several months," said Lee. "The efficiency study simply concurred with our own observations."

In implementing the recommendations of the Governor's efficiency study the State funded Rural Development Grant Program was merged into one administrative unit with the programs of the Division of Community Services. Federally funded Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) programs (Neighborhood Youth Corps, Basic Emergency Employment Program, and Older Americans) formerly administered by the Division of Rural Development Assistance are being transferred to the Division of Manpower Planning in the Office of the Governor.

"What has led to confusion is that a massive reduction of CETA funds available to the State from the Federal government has also occurred this summer," said Lee. "This had created the misconception that the Department of Community and Regional Affairs has reduced funds for rural programs. This is not true."

The Department of Community and Regional Affairs will not be administering any CETA programs after September 30, 1976, which is the completion date of present contracts. The State will continue to operate CETA programs as funds are available through the Division of Manpower, Office of the Governor. Any inquiries regarding CETA programs should now be made to Mr. Earl Costello, Director, Division of Manpower, Office of the Governor, Juneau.

"It is my understanding the Division of Manpower will establish field offices throughout the State to administer CETA programs after September 30th," said Lee.

Many positions with the Divisions of Rural Development Assistance were directly associated with the Administration of the CETA programs.
