Mr. Dan came to Eielson as

a trainee under the multi-agency Domestic Action Program. Project Hire is unique in that it is designed specifically for Alaska and is considered one of the principal Equal Employment Opportunity efforts by the Department of Defense in this

state.

Mr Dan began work at Eielson December 15, 1969, as a pipefitter in the 5010th Civil Engineering Squadron. He successfully completed two study courses for heating systems specialists and received three promotions. The most recent was Christmas Eve.
