ASTAC buys Prudhoe Exchange

Alascom, Inc. and the Arctic Slope Telephone Cooperative Association (ASTAC) have signed an agreement for ASTAC to purchase the local telephone exchange at Deadhorse/Prudhoe Bay for \$1,27 million.

Under the agreement ASTAC will also provide specific maintenance services for seven small satellite earth stations on the

North Slope. Ownership of the stations will remain with Alascom.

Alascom had installed the exchange because of the need for the facility during the building of the Trans-Alaska Oil Pipeline. The exchange was granted to Alascome on a temporary basis through the Alaska Public Utilities Commission on which last

year approved the sale of the ex-

change to ASTAC.

ASTAC general manager Dean Moore says the firm will put in local exchanges at all seven villages. About 650 subscribers are expected to be on line by November of this year in Point Lay, Point Hope, Wainwright, Atkasook, Nuiqsut, Anatuvuk Pass and Kaktovik.
