Copper Center women take once-in-lifetime trip outside

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"You had better take a good look at those mountains," Eileen Star says to her friend, 83-year-old Sophie Lincoln of Copper Center.

"I'm just like a little child," Lincoln sparkles. "I'm so excited!" For the first time in her life, Sophie Lincoln is going to take a trip Outside. In just two hours, she and her friend, Elizabeth Pete, also of Copper Center, will board a plane at Anchorage International Airport and will fly to Dallas, Texas.

Later, they will move on to Florida and sunshine, and finally they will journey to South Carolina, where they might see some little mountains. They plan to return home on April 20 It is also Pete's first trip Outside.

The journey is a result of an invitation extended to Lincoln last January from Faye Crandall. "We know her for a long time," Lincoln explains. "She was a missionary here. She's nice." In fact, before Crandall left Alaska, Lincoln adopted her as a daughter. Lincoln has had eight children

of her own, but only one is still living.

Crandall lives in Dunedin, Florida, which is in the Tampa-St. Paul area, Lincoln is also looking forward to seeing her grandson, 11-year-old Stanley Lincoln, who lives there with his mother. She is an Oklahoma Indian.

"Stanley was born in 1970." Pete explains. "In 1971 or '72, he went Outside. So we haven't seen Stanley since he was a little baby." They will visit friends and relatives of Pete's in South Carolina.

Neither of the women have any idea what they will do or see once they get Outside, although they do expect to make at least one visit to the beach. "I don't know Outside. I not plan to go," Lincoln explains.

"I don't know what we'll see," Pete adds. "Faye just invited us to go down there, so we go down. Faye knows more about what we'll do. Us, we just go along. Whatever Faye says, we'll do!"

Both women have flown before, but not on a large jetliner such as will be taking them down South. They are not

worried, however, "We don't know the big planes," Lincoln confides. "It's all right, they say."


Pete admits there are some things down south which could prove frightening. "What scares me is the snake in a box," she says. "And the spiders. They say they are poisonous and everything!"
