2 New Program at UA's Southeastern Senior College

Two new programs will be offered in Sitka this fall by the University of Alaska, Southeastern Senior College. One will be a competency based Bachelor of Education degree program, and the other a Special Education Resource Teacher certificate and master's degree program.

Three upper division courses in the professional education sequence for the Bachelor of Education degree will be offered this fall, each of which includes 2

hours per week practicum in a school classroom.

Students who already have substantial course work may have their transcripts evaluated for their inclusion in the new B.Ed. program.

The Special Education Resource Teacher program will offer two graduate level courses this fall and two more in the spring. Courses for the fall will include Educating the Exceptional Child in the Regular Classroom (Ed 609) which is

open to all teachers and resource teachers.

The practicum (Ed 610) can be accomplished in the teacher's regular classroom and is open to all, but enrollment will be limited to ten with resource teachers receiving preference under terms of the grant received from Alaska Department of Education.

Spring semester courses are designed specifically for preparing resource teachers, and include a resource teaching practicum.

Other courses in education and one or more courses in management science will also be offered.

Southeastern Senior College advisors for all programs will be available at registration which is scheduled from 3:00 - 7:00 p.m. September 10 and from 9:00 - 11:00 a.m. September 11 at Sitka Community College.

Class schedules will be available at Sitka Community College August 29. For further information you may contact Southeastern Senior College, P.O. Box 1447, Juneau or the Sitka Community College office.

Accidents in Power Presses

A new reporting requirement covering accidents involving mechanical power presses has been issued by the U.S. Department of Labor, announced James W. Lake, assistant regional director for the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) in Seattle.

Lake said that employers are now required to make a written report within 30 days whenever an employee is injured in a mechanical power press accident and that employers' records will be checked during routine safety and health inspections to make sure that such injury reports have been filed.

Forms for reporting these accidents are available from OSHA area offices, but Lake says any written format will suffice as long as all the required information is supplied.

The reports should be sent to: Director of the Office of Standards Development, OSHA, U.S. Dept. of Labor, Washington, D.C. 20210.

Lake explained that this requirement has been established to initiate a thorough accident investigation on the number and types of injuries which may lead to possible revisions of the standards relating to mechanical power presses.

OSHA's concern, he said, is to make sure that the standard protects workers without imposing undue burdens on employers.

The new reporting requirements were published in the Federal Register of December 3, 1974, and failure to comply will be considered a violation of safety standards.

Two Agencies for Ad Promotion

Commissioner of Commerce and Economic Development Tony Motley recently announced the selection of two agencies for handling advertising, promotion, publications production and public relations for his department.

The Alaska-based agency of Murray, Kraft and Rockey has been selected to handle publications production and promotion for the Division of Economic Enterprise. Fawcett-McDermott-Cavanaugh, Inc., of Honolulu has been selected to handle national media advertising and cooperative programs with the visitor industry for the Division of Tourism.

Motley said, "This combination of agency resources provides the Department in-state strength along with the nation-wide

marketing abilities of a highly successful agency. Our advertising budget will be less this year despite inflationary increases in media costs.

"Through internal economies, however, we expect to get more exposure for Alaska as a travel destination than was provided by previous programs."

In his announcement, Motley said there are two contracts being awarded. One for the Division of Economic Enterprise for \$50,000, which went to Murray, Kraft and Rockey, and the other for the Division of Tourism for \$400,000.
