

## Kotlik High School dedication

On Wednesday evening, September 10, Kotlik School in the Lower Yukon School District, held an open house fro their newly completed high school. The new school has five classrooms, a kitchen, restrooms and shower facilities. The new school was constructed by A.C.E. Construction Company out of Fairbanks.

The evening began with a spaghetti and chocolate cake dinner prepared by the teaching staff. During dinner, Principal Pete Harter welcomed the public and invited them to tour the building and visit with the teachers. The school staff was introduced, and it includes returning teachers; Stan and Cyndi Lujan, Michael Wilson, Richard Nathan, and Candace Harter. The new teachers are Lou and Gloria Brandon, Brian Rise, Kris Pier-son, and Susan Evans. The teacher aides were also present, and they were introduced. The new school houses 44 students, grades 7-12. The elementary grades occupy the old BIA school which was turned over to the Lower Yukon School District REAA in 1979, Kotlik school has a total of 91 students and is off to a very good start this 1980-81 school year.
