Recently, Barrow citizens were shown a demonstration of "Texas Democracy"...The newly elected P.T.A. president was "re-called" at the next meeting following his election by 72 teachers, administrators, employees, and/or their spouses. Apparently, the administration "encouraged" their employees to "recall" P.T.A. President John Danner because they wanted a president more supportive of the following accomplishments during the past 7 years as a public school after assuming "local control" from the BIA in 1974:

1. Lowest student achievement in the nation, possibly;
2. Highest drop-out rate in the country;
3. Most G.E.D. Certificates awarded, proportionately;
4. Highest paid teachers and administrators "in the world";
5. Lowest student-teacher ratio;
6. Most money spent per student—over \$4,000 per year per student or \$18½ million for 1,000 students;

7. Largest percentage of prospective Barrow High School students voluntarily attending schools elsewhere—25 of approximately 100 students are currently attending Mr. Edgecumbe, Unalakleet, Anchorage, and "Lower 48" schools.

8. Proportionately, the smallest number of "graduates" of the last 6 years attending college, technical schools, or other post-secondary programs—the writer is aware of 3 or 4 in 6 years;

9. "Most texans employed in any one school district outside the state of Texas."

Coincidentally, the three (3) school board incumbents were, soundly, defeated in the recent election by Emily Wilson, Ilene McLean, and Jana Voss Panigeo.
