Arctic Circle Air was formed about six years ago by Doug Butler as a small air taxi service based in Ft. Yukon, and it has progressed to a manyplane fleet during the last two years under its new owner. Gwitchyaa Zhee.

Wien Air serves many points in rural Alaska with larger jets. and in many cases subcontracts service to places with smaller air strips to local air operators. This benefits local comunities by supporting these businesses, as well as bringing badly-needed air service to smaller way points. Most runways do not have the 5,000-foot blacktop air strip required to land a jet, as well as other limiting factors

The new Bandierante will be able to get in and out of the 3,000-foot field at Galena, Ft. Yukon and Fairbanks comfortably with a full load of passengers and freight.

Fort Yukon was founded by the Hudson Bay Comapny as a trading post in 1847, and is one of the oldest continuously inhabited villages in the interior of Alaska. It is north of the Arctic Circle, so visitors flying on the new Bandierante can receive one of Wien's Arctic Circle certificates for crossing that line.
