Kotzebue's Centennial project is named "utukkuktuk-agvik," a marvelous Eskimo mouthful meaning a place having old things. And what else could you call a museum?

The building is nearly complete with electrical fixtures, painting and shelves being worked on. The city is ready for tourist and expects eight to ten thousand visitors during the Centennial year.

A \$500 assist for the Homer Natural History museum has been given by that city's branch of the National Bank of Alaska. The roof of this Centennial project is about complete, according to sponsors, Homer Society of Natural History.
