

Doyon subsidiary names new officers

The Board of Directors of International Technology Limited (ITECH) has appointed two new officers of the corporation and a new Vice-President has been named. ITech specializes in large scale surveying projects,

using inertial systems and satellite technology.

Helen Andon, originally of Tanana was appointed Corporate Secretary. She served on the Board of Directors of Doyon, Limited in 1978 and 1979 and
