# Jund Appointed

Commissioner Frederick McGinnis, Department of Health and Social Services, announced the appointment of Miss Lois M. Jund as assistant director of the Division of Public Health. She succeeds Leif Thorne-Thomsen who retired on Aug. 16.

This represents a return to state employment for Miss Jund who once served as Public Health administrative director for the department during Territorial days from 1948 through 1956.

Prior to 1948, she was a health education consultant for the department. Described by Commissioner McGinnis as being "richly qualified for this position," Miss Jund is a graduate of Wellesley College and holds an MPH degree from Yale Medical School.

She has had unusually broad public health experience with a unique blend of federal and state experience as well as voluntary agency experience.

Serving as a Public Health representative in the U.S. Public Health Service from 1957 to 1958, she had a primary responsibility for grants programs and management consultation.

From 1958 until 1974, she was associated with the Arctic Health Research Center in Fairbanks, functioning as its chief from July 1973 until its recent closure last March.

"We are delighted," reported Commissioner McGinnis, "to fill this important post with an in-

dividual so thoroughly conversant with Alaska and with management techniques in public health."

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR UTILITY TARIFF REVISION  
The ALASKA PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION hereby gives notice of the filing of a tariff revision by BETHEL UTILITIES CORPORATION (BUC), designated as TA2-43, for the purpose of including an automatic fuel cost rate adjustment clause in its tariff, applicable to its authorized service area at Bethel, Alaska. The clause would allow the utility to change its electric rates by means of a surcharge on each customer bill to reflect increases or decreases in the price of fuel oil used by the utility for generating electricity. BUC states that the price of fuel has increased from 24.5 cents a gallon as of October 1, 1973, to 39 cents a gallon as of June 6, 1974. The surcharge will be calculated according to a standardized formula which will take into account the difference between base period fuel cost and current fuel cost and the efficiency of the utility's electric system.
