Anderson and Gardner in showdown for House speaker

JUNEAU Sen, John C, Sacket (R-Galena) and Sen Frank Ferguson (D-Kotzebue) have announced that their priorities for the Fleventh Alaska Legislature are education and jobs in rural Alaska

Sackett has been appointed to serve a second session as Chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee. Senator Ferguson, recently reclected to his second term, has been appointed as Chairman of the Senate Labor and Management Committee and as Vice Chairman of the Senate Helath, Education and Social Services Committees.


In order to achieve the priorities, Sackett and Ferguson said they are considering the possibility of using taz incentives to encourage the growth of private enterprise while promoting more jobs for rural Alaskans.

Both senators say they plan to work closely with Sen. Bill Sumner (R Anchorage). Chairman of the Senate Employment Opportunities Committee and the Senate Resources Committee.

Schators Sackett and Ferguson say they are confident that tunds available will be used to the best benfit of all Alaskans and will "once again ensure that the much needed bush priorities will be given the emphasis they want."

At press time, the House of Representatives has still not yet organized its leadership. An apparent showdown is developing for the top post of Speaker between Rep. Nels Anderson, Jr. (D-Dillinghata) and Rep. Terry. Gardner. (D-Ketchikan).

lators "appears to be hanging together well" according to close observers, but, if they fail to maintain unity, it could spell defeat for their leadership plan.

The organizers have not made any comment on a reported offer from House Republicans to join with bush legislators to control the House leadership. The Republicans have reportedly offered Anderson the position of Speaker and agreed to make concessions on bush priorities in order to create the coalition.
