NEA-Alaska announces endorsements

Binkley endorsed

State Rep. Johne Binkley has received the endorsement of the 224-member Qaluyaat Herring Association for his election to the state Senate.

Binkley is seeking the Senate seat left vacant by the retirement of Sen. John Sackett of Ruby.

Association President David Bill said Binkley's effort to open and support the fishery for use by the local residents was the reason for the endorsement.

"We are endorsing Johne because he's worked hard to open up the fishery and protect our subsistence lifestyle," Bill said.

The herring fishery opened in 1985 and resulted in the harvest of about 1,500 tons of fish. The estimated boost to the local economy was about \$540,000.

The Qaluyaat Herring Association, which is composed of representative from five village in the Nelson Island area, voted to endorse Binkley at a membership meeting in Nightmute recently.

Begich blasts Young

Democratic contender for Alaska's lone seat in the U.S. House of Representatives, Pegge Begich, blasted Rep. Don Young's absenteeism in recent remarks.

"Alaska needs full-time representation in Congress. Alaskans deserve to have their voices heard on drug laws, sanctions against South Africa and Soviet detention of American reporters," she said.

Begich charged that Republican Young stretched a scheduled threeweek vacation planned by Congress into a 30-day vacation.

She said that the week after the House reconvened Sept. 8, Young missed 19 roll-call votes, all floor sessions and all committee meetings.

Young gets contribution

Alaskans for Don Young recently announced the endorsement of Young's re-election bid to the U.S. House by the Veterans of Foreign Wars Political Action Committee.

In addition to the endorsement, the VFW-PAC presented the congressman with a \$1,000 contribution.

"The purpose of the VFW-PAC is to support congressional candidates who demonstrate support for both veterans' programs and strong national security," said Arthur J. Fellwock, chairman of the VFW-PAC Board of Directors. "Congressman Young's record clearly demonstrates that he is deserving of the VFW-PAC endorsement."

Fishermen support Olds

Dr. Glenn Olds, Democratic candidate for the U.S. Senate, has received the endorsement of the Cordova District Fishermen United.

The organization's president, Bob Blake, said the group needs good representation in federal government because fishing is the economy of Cordova and an important resource of Alaska.

"CDFU feels that with Dr. Olds' background, leadership ability and concerns that Alaskans will be heard in Washington, D.C," Blake said.

The group is a nonprofit association of commercial fishermen organized in the 1930s to protect, promote and encourage the commercial fishing industry.

Cowper outlines policy

Ensuring jobs for Alaskans, giving more authority to local governments and developing a safe and effective transportation system in Alaska which assists economic development, are among the goals of a state transportation policy outlined recently by Democratic gubernatorial candidate Steve Cowper.

Cowper said despite different types of transportation throughout Alaska, each mode should be adequately funded. He also called for a new system of determining which new road construction projects are necessary.

"New projects should be necessary and justifiable, not political porkbarrels for politicians," Cowper said. "Maintenance should be efficient and intelligent so that several agencies or governments are not trying to do the same jobs."

Cowper said that with a sensible transportation program in place. Alaskans can enjoy and benefit from the \$400 million spent annually on transportation improvements and maintenance in Alaska.
