Tundra Times offices are established in Anchorage

Friends and readers of the Tundra Times are cordially invited to an open house at the new offices of the newspaper in Anchorage, according to an announcement by Tundra Times board chairman Willie Hensley.

The open house will begin at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, September 15, lasting until 7:00 p.m. The newspaper's new offices are at the corner of 7th Avenue and 'I' Street, on the second floor above the Anchorage Daily News

offices.

In becoming an Anchoragebased newspaper, the Tundra Times has not entirely left Fairbanks. With the September 6 issue of the weekly, the newspaper becomes the first newspaper in Anchorage to be printed in Fairbanks.

The weekly maintains its early-afternoon Tuesday dead-

line. Camera-ready paste-up sheets of the paper are prepared in Anchorage, "Goldstreaked" via Alaska Airlines to Fairbanks. and printed by Commercial Printing Company of Fairbanks in time for Wednesday morning distribution in both Fairbanks and Anchorage. Second class mail subscriptions are to be mailed at the Fairbanks International Airport post office on the publication date.

in staying with Commercial Printing was quality," according to Tundra Times business manager Robert Polasky. "Commercial is unsurpassed in Alaska for black and white reproduction, and has an excellent international reputation for color process." he added. The Tundra Times has begun to publish full editions once each quarter, and hopes to more fully utilize Commercial's color capability in weekly editions.

Moving to Anchorage with the Tundra Times are business manager Polasky, advertising manager Jack O. Hakkila, and editor and publisher Tom Richards, Jr. The newspaper is currently recruiting to fill positions of bookkeeper, staff artist and typesetter.

The decision to relocate the Tundra Times offices to Anchorage has been under consideration for over five years, and was formally approved this past spring.

"The primary consideration
