Alakamuk Museum of Culture and Nature



The museum is alive and doing quite well. The museum was born as a result of last quarter's Cultural Heritage: Museum Development class. The students from the Native Arts & Crafts classes contributed items they had made to be put on display, along with those done by the Museum class members. As a result of this beginning effort, more than thirty artifacts and items are now on display. Displayed items now include: carved spoons, ladles, bowls, seal lures, snow goggles, dolls, toys, masks, blubber lamps, mukluks, blackfish traps, dog sleds, diagram of beaver snares, a seal retriever. In addition to the display case in the gymnasium, the science room also contains many examples of our Native wildlife, many of which will become a permanent part of the museum. New additions will be forthcoming including a written history of the Catholic Church and the National Guard in Alakanuk
