# AN OPEN LETTER TO ALL A

## Dear Alaskans.

Despite glowing promises by Congressmen to accommodate Alaskans, the (d)(2) legislation passed by the House (H.R. 39) will virtually destroy the Alaskan way of life.

Take a look at how Alaskans were accommodated in H.R. 39:

- 1. Negates the Statehood Act provision giving the State the right to manage resident fish and wildlife statewide.
- 2. Gives the Secretary of Interior the ultimate authority to regulate fish and wildlife uses on all Federal lands in Alaska
- 3. Establishes administrative and regulatory requirements of the State which appear in conflict with the State Constitu-
- 4. Requires the State to establish regional administrative and regulatory structure in fish and game management-an unprecedented requirement for any state.
- 5. Requires the State to finance complex and expensive Subsistence programs even if Federal monies are not available.
- 6. Gives over-lapping jurisdiction to the Secretaries of Commerce and Interior to regulate activities within six (6) miles of Alaska's coast; thus potentially creating chaos for fisheries enhancement, research, and management.
- 7. Gives no guarantees of continued traditional access to lands and waters under Federal control.
- 8. Takes away a significant portion of traditional State control of access on navigable waters.
- 9. Takes away a significant portion of traditional State control of water appropriations.
- 10. Will eventually close a good portion of the State to trapping.
- 11. Defines Subsistence to exclude commercial trapping.
- 12. Will result in almost fifty million (50,000,000) acres or oneseventh (1/7) of Alaska being managed by the National Park Service.
- 13. Places up to 60% of Alaska's Dall Sheep habitat under Park Service control.
- 14. Places up to 26% of Alaska's Moose habitat under Park Service control.
- 15. Places up to 31% of Alaska's Brown Bear habitat under Park Service control.
- 16. Places up to 34% of Alaska's Caribou habitat under Park Service control.
- 17. Proposes that almost one hundred million (100,000,000) acres or one-fourth (1/4) of Alaska will be managed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service under the Refuge System. This occurs simultaneously with recommendations of the "National Wildlife Refuge Study Task Force" to deemphasize hunting, fishing, and trapping as primary uses of Refuge lands.
- 18. Makes Wild and Scenic Rivers a protective corridor four (4) miles wide in Alaska versus one-half (1/2) mile wide in similar areas of the lower 48 states.

Virtually all of the privileges granted to other states, such as fish and wildlife management, water appropriation rights, navigable water control, access to public lands, and use of Federal lands by State residents are being denied Alaska.

We cannot believe that Alaskans will stand by and let the years of struggle for Statehood by the late Senators Bartlett and Gruening and other Alaskans be wasted! We cannot let our lifestyles be destroyed by one quick. ill-conceived act of Congress.

Because this bill is equal in importance and impact to the current Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms proposal to register our firearms, we urge you once again to UNITE, as the firearms supporters united against B.A.T.F's irrational proposal. In essence, H.R. 39 restricts your use of firearms . . . and your traditional uses of a vast area of YOUR state—Alaska!!
