ventions. These have indicated interest in coming to Alaska – if we provide the facilities.



Another 25% will help pay the operating expenses of the hosting facility, with nearly 5% more going to debt service. The food and drink consumed will take another 13% of the convention dollar while various taxes — excluding income tax — will account for nearly 5% more. Finally, there will be a State income tax contribution out of the 11.6% before taxes profit figure.
