Three whales is never enough for the village even ten whales,

I'd say to them.

"What? Why ten whales is never enough for the village?"

"That is a very good question you bring out," I said. "I could give you an explanation

about the what."

Here it is: About 23 canoes always goes out in spring to hunt whales and seven or eight men would be in a canoe which is average. Now supposing these 23 canoes has eight men crew in each canoe total would be 184 men.

And whenever one whale caught all the canoes would have or get their divident share from whale, and each crew after the divident would get sometime for two meals. Now we see what you mean by that, your right when you say ten whales is never enough.

Any more questions?

No, there is no more questions but we know now the Eskimos are never selfish, always ready to share some of their catch.
