Federal Impact Program on Migration Needed

Attorney General John E. Havelock said that without a federal impact program on migration, Alaska may "find her growth and development plans and programs brushed aside or crushed by populations movements we are powerless to control."

He told the Northwest Re-

Nor, Havelock said, should they "be forced by economic necessity to do so."

At the same time, the Attorney General said, "we have a great influx of unemployed people from other states seeking the false promise of high paying jobs and open lands which is one of the prevalent myths of Alaska."

Havelock made the remarks in an address on regional planning during which he also leveled criticism at certain portions of "Towards a National Growth Strategy," the first report of the National Policy Task Force of the American Institute of Architects.
