The Food and Drug Administration announced that manu-facturers have voluntarily agreed to improve the safety of vacuum bottles with special emphasis on containers intended for use by children.

In meetings with officials of FDA's Bureau of Product Safety, representatives of the va-cuum bortle industry have a-greed that vacuum bottles under 16 ounces intended for use by children (indicated by labeling, cartoons, pictures, etc.) will be required to pass a drop test to make sure that broken glass


