with Alaskan Athabascan languages. Dr. Michael Krauss. native language center director, Kari, a research assistant in Navajo Reading Study at the

University of New Mexico, will study Alaskan Athabascan linguistics and help train Alaskan Athabasean speakers as language specialists.

He also plans to conduct survey work in Alaskan Athabascan. languages and extend his docu-

mentation of the Tanaina language of the Cook Inlét area.

Ritter, assistant professor of linguistics at Michigan State University, will help develop and design linguistic and literacy material in written as well as unwritten Athabascan dialects, and will assist and train native speakers in practical linguistic work

According to Dr. Krauss. Kari and Ritter "will be an integral part next year of a group of Athabaseanists and Athabaseans who are advanced students and or talented native speakers of about five Athabascan languages, in the foretront both in academic research and applied educational developments."
