## **Look Up and Live' TV Series**

The people, culture, history and value systems of native Alas-kans, who stand to be affected by land claims action and the development of oil resources in the state, will be examined on a three-part CBS-TV series on "Look Up and Live" on successive Sundays, starting November 8 (5:00-6:00 pm AST) in color on KTVF, Channel 11.

Filmed last July in several major cities and small villages in Alaska, the series is titled "The Native Alaskan" and focuses solely on people indigenous to the area.

Part I on Sunday, November 8 is subtitled "Reflections" and looks at the land and its culture. Part II on Sunday, November 15, "Realities," deals with present life styles.

The final broadcast on Sun-

day, November 22, "Prospects," studies possible effects of current land claims and oil development problems in Alaska.

Sites visited on the series include Anchorage, Bethel, Fairbanks, Fort Yukon, Hoonah, Juneau, Kipnuk, Klukwan, Rampart, Sitka and Stevens Village.

Among those appearing on all three broadcasts are Robert Willard, executive director of the Alaska State Commission for Human Rights; Byron Mallott, executive director, Rural Community Program; State Senator Ray Christiansen of Bethel;

Margaret Nick, secretary, Alaska Federation of Natives, and John Borbridge, first vice president, Alaska Federation of Natives, and president, Central Council of Tlingit and Haida

Indians.

"Look Up and Live" is a presentation of CBS News, with Pamela llott executive producer. "The Native Alaskan" was produced by Chalmers Dale and written by Alva I. Cox, Jr.
