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EDA Grants to Alaska Native Associations

Representative Don Young announced that the Economic Development Administration is continuing its series of grants to Alaskan Native Associations for planning economic growth and new jobs in rural Alaska.

Young said that the FDA has awarded two \$50,000 grants to Arctic Slope Native Associations in Barrow and another to the Bristol Bay Native Association. Representative Don Young

Arctic Stope Native Associations in Barrow and another to the Bristol Bay Native Association in Dillingham to help both groups conduct planning and development programs for one

year.
"I am very happy that the Associations themselves are con-Associations themselves are contributing to help their own te-gion. In Bristol Bay the Association is providing \$17,000 and in Barrow \$18,000 the program," Young said.
