

At Festival of Native Arts—

Show Includes Russian Photos

The Alaska Festival of Native Arts (June 1 thru 29) will feature a display of Russian Photographs at the Anchorage Historical and Fine Arts Museum.

The display is part of a mammoth native arts show being conducted by the Festival of Native Arts in cooperation with the Alaska Festival of Music.

Correspondence between Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin of the Soviet Union, Mike Gravel, U.S. Senator from Alaska and Francine and Chuck Lastufka of the Festival of Native Arts, managed to cut through the wheels of bureaucracy and, in a relative-

ly short period of time, the photographs were on their way to Alaska for the Festival.

The pictures depict the life in every aspect of the Siberian Eskimos, their work, crafts, home-life, play and their country.

The Russian display joins another foreign exhibit, Tupilaks (ivory or whale's tooth carvings of mythical characters) carvings by the Greenland Eskimos.

The Festival will have live performances of Alaskan native dancers, storytellers, craftsmen and native game performances on June 19, 20 and 21 at the museum.
