

Arco announces leadership changes

Harold C. Heinze, president of Arco Alaska Inc. since 1983, has been named president of Arco Transportation Co., effective July. He will be headquartered in Long Beach, Calif.

Succeeding Heinze as head of Arco Alaska will be William E. Wade Jr., now Arco's vice president of corporate planning, based in Los Angeles.

The leadership changes were announced by Arco President Robert E. Wycoff and Executive Vice President James S. Morrison.

Heinze, 44, first came to Alaska with Arco in February 1969. He is completing his third assignment here, totaling 14 years. He joined Arco in 1965 and has held a variety of management and planning assignments, including vice president of Arco Oil and Gas Co.'s Mid Continent District in Tulsa before returning to Alaska in 1983. He is a senior vice president of Arco.

Wade, also 44, joined Arco in 1968 following graduation from the Sloan School of Management at MIT where he received a masters of management. He attended the University of Tennessee, graduating with a bachelor of science degree in chemical engineering.

Heinze succeeds Hiram E. Bond as president of Arco Transportation. Bond has elected early retirement from Arco, effective Feb. 1, 1988. Pending his retirement, Bond will handle a number of special projects for Arco, including issues involving the Trans Alaska Pipeline System. Arco owns a 21 percent interest in the pipeline.
