

Notti Man Pushes Voter Pre-Registration

"Is the Secretary of State fumbling voter registration?" questioned James E. Fisher, a Kenai regional co-chairman for the campaign of Emil Notti, a candidate for Secretary of State.

"Alarmed that voter registration barely equaled the total vote the 1968 general election, I requested immediate appointment as a voter registrar to try a house-to-house registration ef-

fort," explained Fisher.

"Although my application was made by telegram and followup letter, I have not received an answer 5 days later. If the incumbent Secretary of State is as slow administering this program in other parts of Alaska, many voters will be denied the right to vote," Notti's chairman stated.

Voter registration in Alaska is handled by the Secretary of State's office. A recent statement from that office indicated only 2,000 more people have registered than voted in the 1968 general election.

Studies have shown only 70 per cent of registered voters in the United States actually go to the polls.

"Emil Notti favors registra-

tion of all qualified Alaskans—regardless of political party affiliation. If elected Secretary of State, you may be certain Emil Notti would do his utmost to assure every possible voter is registered," the Notti chairman said.
