Some years ago, she visited 250 Indian reservations in Canada, in which she stressed the importance of education and religious teaching and instilling pride in their heritage. In recognition of her efforts, she was given the Indian name Pitake, or Eagle Woman.

Her father came to Alaska from New Brunswick, Canada. Her mother, born in Alaska, was

of Athabascan and Eskimo descent.

Mrs. Harrison's daughter, Gai Agwiak, and son, Denis Harrison, both live in Anchorage. In addition, Mrs. Harrison has been a foster mother to 36 children over the years. One child, Kosmos, a fifth grader, is still at home.

An active member of ARCO's Speakers Bureau, Mrs. Harrison also is a volunteer in the Anchorage School District's Community Resource Program.
