

# Stanford University seeks Native students

Stanford University is recruiting interested American Indians and Alaska Natives to its graduate and professional degree programs. Stanford is a private, research-oriented institution and is located on the San Francisco Peninsula, 30 miles south of the City of San Francisco. The University is organized into seven Schools: Earth Sciences,

Education, Engineering, Graduate School of Business, Humanities and Sciences, Law, and Medicine. Within the Schools are 70 departments.

In addition there are 27 institutes, centers, and laboratories. Some of the major ones are the Hoover Institution on War, Revolution, and Peace; the Food Research Institute;

the Center for Research in International Studies; the W. W. Hansen Laboratories of Physics; and the Stanford Linear Accelerator Center.

Stanford enrolls approximately 12,000 students; 6,600 are undergraduates and 5,200 graduates. This year the Native American enrollment includes 31 undergraduate and 28 graduate students. This group represents over 40 tribal groups and Native communities.

Native American graduate students at Stanford have established and maintained an excellent scholastic record. Since 1971, seven have received Master of Business Administration degrees, eleven have received law

degrees, and four have received medical degrees. In the School of Education, nineteen have received Master's degrees.

In Engineering, three have been awarded Master of Science Degrees while in the Humanities Sciences, fourteen have received Master of Arts degrees, and two, the Ph.D. Many of those who have completed their degree programs are now working in professional positions and are sponsors several cultural events during the year. Activities are culminated in an annual Pow-Wow which is held on campus in May.

Persons interested in learning more about Stanford University and its academic programs may

helping to meet the needs of Native American communities.
