Stevens pointed out that persons representing themselves as agents of Alyeska Pipeline Service Company have contacted truck drivers, heavy equipment operators and construction engineers in several states offering gineers in several states offering work on the trans-Alaska pipe-

These individuals reportedly offer, in some cases for a placement fee, a guarantee of a job

on the pipeline.
Communication with Alyeska
Pipeline Service confirmed the
growing proportions of this
activity.

Senator Stevens requested that Alaskans inform their relatives and friends in the south 48 of this type of illegal activity. He said that anyone in the south 48 encountering people claiming to be agents of Alaska business corporations should check their references with the home office of that company before paying out employment before paying out employment fees or moving to Alaska

#### Tiny Tammy Ortega Overwhelmed

Tiny Tammie Ortega was overwhelmed last summer when she was chosen in the Coopera-tive Job Education Program at Highlands University as a summer intern to work in the office of her Congressman Manuel Lujan in Washington.

"After all," she explained

later, "there are not that many

people from Guadalupita, New Mexico, who get to go to work in Washington."

But this turned out to be

only the beginning of a rewarding summer for the 21-year-old senior at Highlands University in

Las Vegas, New Mexico.

No sooner had she felt that her feet were really touching Washington soil than the second wave of dreamland struck her

wave of dreamland struck her a call to go to work at the White House.

"I could not believe that all of these things were actually happening to me in the span of a few weeks," she recounted in the Old Executive Building before returning to Highlands fore returning to Highlands University to obtain her degree in journalism.

During the summer she not only got the opportunity to personally observe the workings of the office of her Congressman but to work in the Office of Communications Director, Herbert Flow

I know there must be many journalism students in this country who would give their right arm to work in the White House, she said.

But it wasn't all luck that got Tammie in the White House. Shortly before Lammie came to Snortly before tamine came to Washington, Mr. Klein had taken a history-making step in his office by adding Carlos Conde to his communications staff.

"We didn't select "We didn't select. Lammic primarily because she was a Mexican American although that certainly turned out to be an asset," said Ken W. Clawson, Deputy Director of Communications for the Liceutive Branch. "We selected her, because she had ability and enthusiasm for the job."
